

IRB Administration Rates for Single IRB

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
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What is sIRB?

Effective January 25, 2018, all NIH sponsored human subject research that is:

- Not exempt from the requirement for IRB review;
- Multi-site; and
- Includes more than one domestic site;

Must be reviewed by a single IRB.



*Hmmmm. One IRB.
That means it must be
easier, right?*

What is Single (sIRB)?

This new policy means that one IRB will review the science of the research and also review:

- Local law;
- Investigator qualifications;
- Research resources;
- Reportable events (non-compliance, new risk information); and
- All other local issues

For each site during the life of the study.

*Sounds like a lot of
work to me*



Single IRB means lots of work for the reviewing IRB




All of that work costs Money



IRB Authorization Agreements

- Required by funding entities (NIH, DOD, EPA, etc.) and the FDA whenever an institution relies on an external IRB
- Documents the responsibilities of the reviewing IRB and relying institutions
- Often referred to as a “Reliance Agreement.”



Often one study will include multiple different IRB authorization agreements

sIRB Rates

Client	Existing Agreement	Initial Review Rate	Continuing Review Rate
UC Campus	Yes	\$1,600	\$800
Non-UC Campus	Yes	\$1,337	\$1,070
Non-UC Campus	No	\$2,139	\$1,070

Proposals

- Should include a plan that identifies the participating sites and the sIRB
- The increased cost of sIRB may be charged as direct costs
- The sIRB costs must be included in the budget



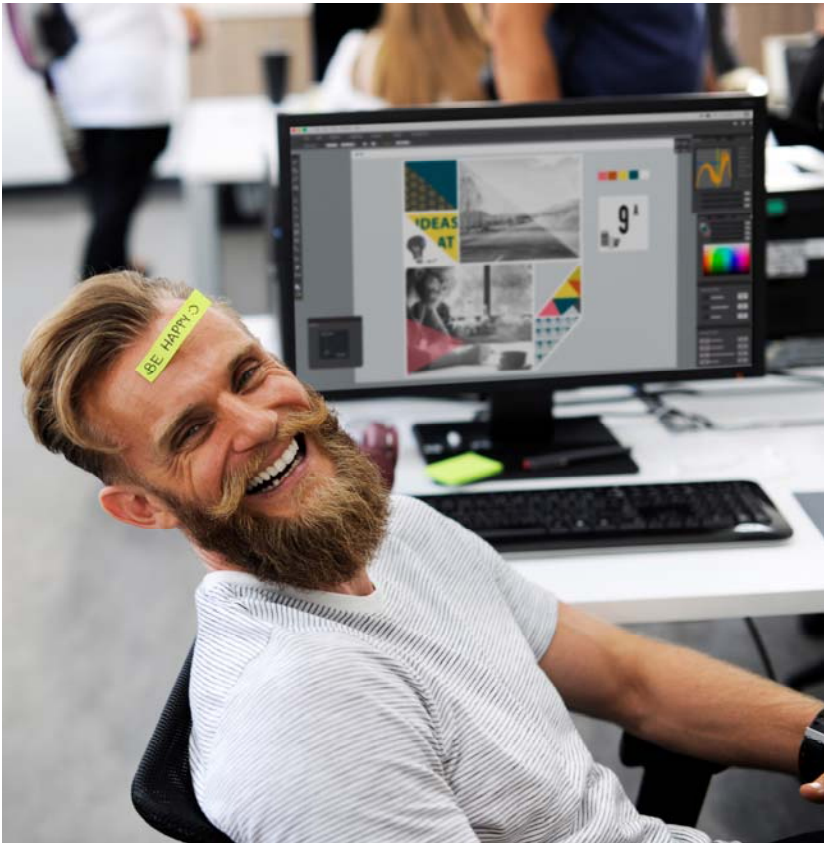
